

## 1972-73 SWIMMING OUTLOOK

#### **RETURNING LETTERMEN: 12**

FORECAST: This is a veteran Cleveland State team, but experience doesn't pay off in swimming as often as it does in some other sports. Thus despite the 12 lettermen on hand, don't look for a repeat of last season's 10-2 record. The loss of three other lettermen is going to tip the scale downward a bit. Freshman Mike Repas is as versatile as the departed John Butler and will probably be better than Butler in most events (which makes him very, very good), but Repas cannot replace Butler and Tom Brunson in the distances, and the Viking freestyle strength will sag somewhat as a result. All-American Kent Kirchner can swim the freestyle events better than anybody on the squad—and probably better than anybody on any opponent's squad—but he can do the same in the backstroke and individual medley and butterfly, and Coach Bob Busbey's biggest problem will be deciding which three events he'd like his star sophomore to win on any given day. The Vikes have excellent depth in the backstroke with Dane Mechlin and Joe Antz likely point winners on any given day. John Thomas is the best butterfly'er ever to swim here—except for Kirchner—and can also perform adequately in the freestyle sprints. Gary Hughes, another of several highly versatile performers on the current squad, could swim butterfly, breaststroke or I-M this season and will be a threat in any of these events, and George Kirk is a strong No. 2 man in either the fly or the freestyle distances. Breaststroke has been a problem since the graduation of All-American Jim Pence, but could be improved this season if newcomer Rolf Jaegersen can take over as hoped, with Captain Steve Bogas and Hughes battling for the second spot. The Vikes need help for veteran Jim Starrett in the sprints, too, and are hoping that Bill Plymesser can fill the bill. Stasie Nicholaides will win points in the I-M and distances, and Curt Jones won't be beaten often in diving, but more depth is needed in these events-which is the story of the Vikings' swim team this season. This is a good group of competitors, however, and don't be surprised if they pull an upset or two along the way.

OUTSTANDING VETERANS: Steve Bogas, team captain and three-year letterman, will swim breaststroke; Curt Jones, team's No. 1 diver for two seasons and rated one of best ever to perform here; Kent Kirchner, All-American as a frosh last year in 200-yd. backstroke and 400-yd. individual medley, holder or co-owner of eight varsity and five pool records; Dane Mechlin, second best backstroker in CSU swim annals; Jim Starrett, top Viking sprinter, anchorman on varsity and pool record-holding 400-yd. free style relay teams; John Thomas, varsity record holder in 100-yd, butterfly.

**TOP NEWCOMERS: Rolf Jaegersen,** transfer student could be team's best breaststroker this winter; **Bill Plymesser,** best sprint prospect on team, must overcome effects of two-year layoff; **Mike Repas,** top freshman by far, could be one of Vikings' alltime bests in several events before graduating.

KEY LOSSES: Tom Brunson solid freestyler, capable of scoring well in every free event from 50 through 1,650; John Butler, one of finest and most versatile swimmers in Cleveland State annals, holds or shares in five varsity and four pool records, broke every CSU varsity free style mark from 100 yards up, also held backstroke, butterfly and individual medley records at one time; Tom Hronis, No. 2 diver, placed 7th in Penn-Ohio low board event.



### ROBERT F. BUSBEY

Director of Athletics and Head Swimming Coach

Cleveland State's energetic athletic director moves into his 26th year at his alma mater, and seventh as the head of the University's sports program, still looking toward new and exciting programs on CSU's athletic horizons. In the past two years he has seen a physical education major and the University's first new athletic facility-the Intramural Sports Center-become realities. Before another year is out he hopes to be comfortably located in the handsome new \$7,000,000 Physical Education Center, rapidly taking shape next door to his present office in the Sports Center. When the facility, expected to be one of the finest in the Midwest, opens its doors, it will mark still another memorable moment for Busbey. who has contributed an abundance of memorable moments to the athletic history of Cleveland State and its forebear, Fenn College, A product of Warren (O.) Harding High, where he captained the school's first



undefeated football team, Busbey became the University's first All-American, winning his honors in swimming in 1948 in the 50 and 100-yd. free style events, and repeating in the 50-yd. free style in 1949. In all, he earned nine varsity letters at Fenn in swimming, baseball, fencing and track, a feat that's never been matched in the University's subsequent athletic history. After graduation he took over as the head swim coach in 1951 (a title he still retains) and in 1964 he was named assistant coach of the U.S. Olympic Swimming Team, the first time a Cleveland college coach had ever been chosen as an Olympic mentor. Sailing has long been a hobby of his and this past summer he added still another laurel to his collection by racing his "Moby Dick," to a national title. When Homer E. Woodling retired as the University's athletic director in July 1966 after a 37-year career, Busbey was named acting athletic director, and in July 1968, he was named athletic director. The school's athletic program has moved swiftly toward national prominence since, producing All-Americans in wrestling, swimming, soccer and track, and an NCAA College Division individual champion in track. The soccer team has won bids to three NCAA post-season tournaments and collected three Ohio championships, and the golf, cross country and wrestling teams have all finished in the top 20 in the NCAA College Division Championships in recent years. Now, with more-than-adequate indoor facilities just around the corner at last, it seems certain that Busbey will turn his attentions toward improving the University's athletic program in still other areas where room for improvement exists. It seems likely that several chapters in the Busbey Saga are yet to be written.
