

## THE VIKINGS' WORLD-FAMED POOL

"The greatest swimmers in the fastest pool at the greatest meet in history" is how the NCAA Swimming Guide described the 1977 NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships held in the lightning-fast waters of the Cleveland State University pool.

If there were dissenters to that opinion they are yet to be heard from.

From the time the CSU Natatorium was opened to an admiring public and a proud student body in 1974 its reputation as one of the finest indoor competitive pools ever built has flourished throughout the land.

The last lingering doubts as to the authenticity of its claim to the title of America's "Super Pool" ended in March of 1975 when the nation's best swimmers and coaches came away singing its praises after the NCAA's Division II and Division I Championships were held in it on consecutive weekends.

Three National AAU Diving Championships, the 1977 and 1979 NCAA Division I Swimming and Diving Championships, the 1978 USA-Russia Diving Meet, a training camp for the 1976 USA Olympic Diving Team and a host of meets of slightly lesser stature have brought continuing tributes in the same vein.

What makes the CSU pool great?

Primarily a deep water competition course with races swum in lanes 12 to 16½ feet deep, exceptionally deep gutters that swallow up waves with the same ease with which Jonah was swallowed up by the whale, and crystal clear water with superb lighting which makes turn walls sharp and clear to competitors.

A mind-boggling 933,000 gallons of water fill the exhibition pool, which is 50 meters in length (with nine eight-foot competitive lanes), 25 yards wide (with 20 seven-foot competitive lanes), is equipped with underwater speakers and six underwater windows for coaching and teaching, and utilizes an ultra-sophisticated Omega automatic timing system with touch pads for up to 10 lanes during meets.

Diving facilities include two one-meter maxiflex boards, two three-meter maxiflex boards, and a diving tower with platforms at 5, 7½ and 10 meters. Each of the platform levels is served by an intercom which can be operated from the coach's position on deck.

The original seating capacity of nearly 1,600 has been augmented by the construction of special television broadcast and camera platforms built originally as temporary structures but converted to permanent facilities because of the frequent appearances of national TV crews. All three major networks — ABC, CBS and NBC — have originated telecasts from the Viking pool.

Tucked away out of sight of spectators beneath the south stands is a bonus for the competitive swimmer, a 25-yard instructional pool used for teaching instruction on a daily basis which serves as an ideal warm-up and/or warm-down pool during major competitions.

It's just a little extra among the many extras which make the Cleveland State pool THE pool in collegiate swimming.

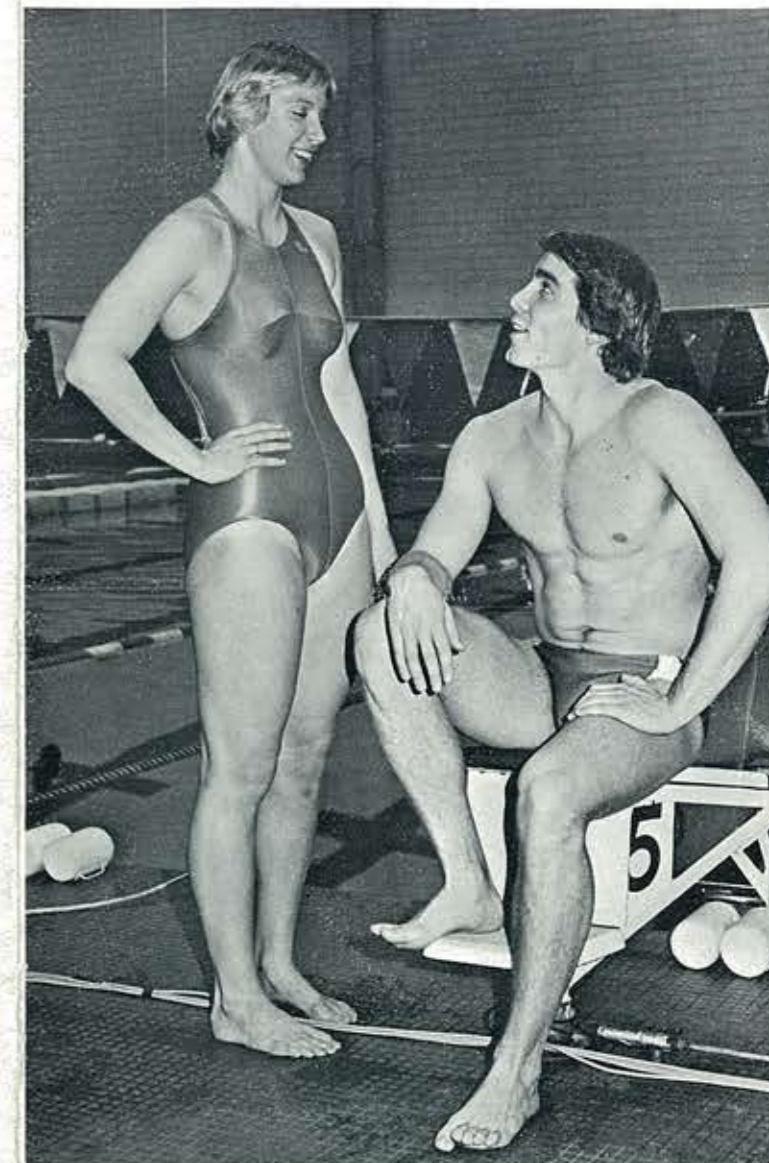

# THE HEAD COACHES

**MEN'S HEAD COACH BOB BUSBEY** has carved a special niche in Cleveland State sports annals and in the world of swimming. Now in his 15th year as Cleveland State's Director of Athletics and his 30th year as the University's head swimming coach, he is a charter member of the CSU Athletic Hall of Fame, CSU's first All-American (as a sprint star for the 1948 and 1949 swimming teams), and most prolific letter winner in its athletic history (nine in swimming, baseball, fencing and track), a member of the Greater Cleveland Sports Hall of Fame and the best-known sports figure produced here in the school's 51-year athletic history. Since his near-legendary days as a swim star, he has served as the assistant coach of the 1964 U. S. Olympic Team; played an integral part in the development of the Cleveland State swimming complex, ranked as the finest indoor competitive facility in the United States; served as meet director for the 1975, 1977 and 1979 NCAA National Swimming and Diving Championships at CSU; and is currently serving as chairman of the prestigious NCAA Swimming Committee, a post he has held since 1976. He has developed a multitude of national and world class swimmers through club activities as well as three All-Americans at CSU and currently oversees a varsity program of 18 intercollegiate sports as Director of Athletics at Cleveland State. The father of three children, he makes his home in Cleveland Heights, Ohio.

**WOMEN'S HEAD COACH DAVE DUDA** assumed his post this year, while working toward his master's degree at the University. The 38-year-old mentor has a lengthy list of credits in coaching dating back to the mid-'60s. His work has put him in charge of both boys' and girls' programs at several high schools and in a number of YMCA programs. He served most recently as head swim coach at Maple Heights (Ohio) High School, and immediately prior to that as head coach for both the boys' and girls' teams at Napoleon (Ohio) High, where he produced four state qualifiers in each of the 1976 and 1977 seasons. One of those qualifiers was Mark Miller, currently a top swimmer on the CSU men's team.

**ASSISTANT SWIM COACH WALLY MORTON**, now in his seventh season here, seems to be as much a part of the magnificent Cleveland State pool complex as the lane markers and diving towers. The man who is entrusted to watch over the pool with tender, loving care, he does just that, whether it is being used for a national championship, a high school race or a student open swim session. He has directed pool operations for four NCAA championship meets, three National AAU Diving Championships and a variety of other meets of various magnitude.

**DIVING COACH JIM FEDOR**, one of the finest divers ever produced at Cleveland State, began tutoring CSU's men and women divers in 1977-78. Now he seems destined to become an even better coach than he was a diver. Fedor products have dominated Penn-Ohio Conference Meets, and now-senior Jeff Dalman has qualified for the NCAA Zone Diving Championships in each of his first three seasons. Fedor himself was a place winner in the Penn-Ohio Meet for three straight years and qualified for the NCAAs in both his junior and senior seasons.

# A LOOK AT THE TEAMS

Swimming at Cleveland State continues to move steadily toward a niche among the very good Division I programs in the land.

## — THE MEN —

The most attractive home schedule in CSU swimming history includes three Big Ten foes, a pair of Mid-American Conference opponents and meets with independent powers Pittsburgh, Penn State and Notre Dame, then climaxes with the Penn-Ohio and Eastern Intercollegiate Conference Meets.

The manpower may not be there to sweep all before them, but the Vikes have enough to make things interesting.

The freestyle sprints will be the Vikings' long suit, thanks particularly to the presence of senior **Joe Stockwell**, junior **Tom Flohn** and sophomore **Paul Vasiloff**. Stockwell, who won three Penn-Ohio individual titles and anchored three winning relays last season, could wipe out all of Olympian Kris Kirchner's varsity marks this season. Flohn, who has improved remarkably in his first two seasons here, is just a shade behind. Vasiloff appears on the way to becoming one of the Vikes' best middle distance swimmers and is also a solid backstroker.

Junior **Mark Miller** will probably round out the Vikings' freestyle relay teams in major meets, but he's also the ace of the distance corps, holding the Penn-Ohio Conference record and two consecutive titles in the 1,650-yard freestyle.

**Tom Svitavsky** won the Penn-Ohio 400 IM as a frosh and is a solid butterfly as well, and freshman **Mark Harold** may be the best breast-stroker here since the days of All-American Jim Pence a decade ago.

Senior **Jeff Dalman**, a three-time NCAA qualifier, heads up a good young springboard corps, and may be ready to challenge for points in the national meet this year.

Good second strength should give the team a solid shot at a sixth straight Penn-Ohio Conference title.

## — THE WOMEN —

Freestyler **Linda Washut** and backstroker **Joan Weber** rank among the finest swimmers produced in the still-young women's swimming program. Between them, they own, or share, in 14 of CSU's 17 varsity swimming marks.

**Roberta Whelan** has been a key member of the squad for two seasons in a variety of events, but will concentrate on butterfly and IM this winter. **Sharon Nekic** is shaping up as the most improved member of the team and its distance mainstay.

**Bev Wells** holds school records for both one- and three-meter diving and should be at her best in this, her senior year. Veteran **Cathy Littell** may push her.

The freshman group is small but talented. Some feel that **Laura Zebold** may eventually become the best all-round woman swimmer in Viking history. **Tracy Kopechek** was a state placer in the sprints as a high school senior. And transfer **Sue Rozum** was a junior college All-American.

The women lack depth, but the first-line talent could carry them through an excellent season.
