



THE VIKINGS' WORLD-FAMED POOL

"The greatest swimmers in the fastest pool at the greatest meet in history" is how the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships held in the lightning-fast waters of the Cleveland State University pool.

If there were dissenters to that opinion they are yet to be heard from.

From the time the CSU Natatorium was opened to an admiring public and a proud student body in 1974 its reputation as one of the finest indoor competitive pools ever built has flourished throughout the land.

The last lingering doubts as to the authenticity of its claim to the title of America's "Super Pool" ended in March of 1975 when the nation's best swimmers and coaches came away singing its praises after the NCAA's Division II and Division I Championships were held in it on consecutive weekends.

Three National AAU Diving Championships, the 1977 and 1979 NCAA Division I Swimming and Diving Championships, the 1978 USA-Russia Diving Meet, the 1980 USA-China Diving Meet, a training camp for the 1976 USA Olympic Diving Team and a host of meets of slightly lesser stature have brought continuing tributes in the same vein.

What makes the CSU pool great?

Primarily a deep water competition course with races swum in lanes 12 to 16½ feet deep, exceptionally deep gutters that swallow up waves with the same ease with which Jonah was swallowed up by the whale, and crystal clear water with superb lighting which makes turn walls sharp and clear to competitors.

A mind-boggling 933,000 gallons of water fill the exhibition pool, which is 50 meters in length (with nine eight-foot competitive lanes), 25 yards wide (with 20 seven-foot competitive lanes), is equipped with underwater speakers and six underwater windows for coaching and teaching, and utilizes an ultra-sophisticated Omega automatic timing system with touch pads for up to 10 lanes during meets.

Diving facilities include two one-meter maxiflex boards, two three-meter maxiflex boards, and a diving tower with platforms at 5, 7½ and 10 meters. Each of the platform levels is served by an intercom which can be operated from the coach's position on deck.

The original seating capacity of nearly 1,600 has been augmented by the construction of special television broadcast and camera platforms built originally as temporary structures but converted to permanent facilities because of the frequent appearances of national TV crews. All three major networks — ABC, CBS and NBC — have originated telecasts from the Viking pool.

Tucked away out of sight of spectators beneath the south stands is a bonus for the competitive swimmer, a 25-yard instructional pool used for teaching instruction on a daily basis which serves as an ideal warm-up and/or warm-down pool during major competitions.

It's just a little extra among the many extras which make the Cleveland State pool THE pool in collegiate swimming.

HEAD MEN'S COACH WALLY MORTON

Last year marked a milestone in the annals of CSU Swimming as Wally Morton took the helm as only the fourth coach in the team's fifty-year history. His predecessor was the University's first All-American swimmer, Bob Busbey, who, after guiding the team for 30 years, decided to turn his full attention to the growing responsibilities of the CSU Athletic Director's job, which he has filled since 1966. But the changeover did not sink the team's winning traditions, as it stroked on to its seventh consecutive Penn-Ohio Conference Championship, the eighth in nine years, finished high in the Eastern Intercollegiate, and qualified its first swimmer in four years for the NCAA Division I Swimming Championships. Not bad for a head coaching debut! But then chlorine seems to run in Morton's blood. Serving as the Assistant Men's Coach and the CSU Natatorium's Aquatics Director for six years, Morton was the logical choice as Busbey's successor. A graduate of Miami (O.) University where he was a member of back-to-back Mid-American Conference championship swimming squads in 1966 and 1967, he soon after became the first physical director and swim coach of the Fairfield (O.) YMCA. There he developed a program which eventually grew to over 150 boys and girls and sent 19 swimmers to the YMCA Nationals. Coming to CSU in 1974, only one year after the opening of the renowned CSU Natatorium, he has directed the pool operations for three NCAA Division I and one NCAA Division II championships, as well as a lengthy list of other major regional, national and international meets. As a result, he is known to virtually every collegiate coach in the country and to high school coaches throughout Ohio. Morton and his wife, Carol, who also works at CSU as an assistant professor of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, live in suburban Strongsville.

HEAD WOMEN'S COACH BOB KLOOS

He arrived at Cleveland State a few years later than originally hoped, but Bob Kloos is finally back and working in the CSU pool - as the head coach of women's swimming. A graduate of suburban Lakewood High School where he ranked seventh in the United States in the 15-17 Age Group 200-yard backstroke and co-captained the Rangers team in 1974, he was ardently wooed by Cleveland State, but elected to go to Cincinnati instead. There he became a four-year letterman for the Bearcats, set five varsity records and competed in the NCAA Division I Championships four times. After his graduation he worked as an assistant coach for the Mariemont Aquatic Club and the Lakewood Recreation Swim Team in 1978 and 1979, became Head Age Group Coach of the Dayton Dolphins in September, 1979 and in 1980 took over as Head Age Group Coach of the Dayton Raiders. He returned to CSU to pursue graduate coursework in the Cleveland State Human Performance Laboratory this past fall and took over the coaching reins of the women's team at that time. Kloos is single and currently lives in Lakewood.



DALMAN

Entering his first season as **Head Diving Coach, Jeff Dalman**, a CSU alum, follows in the tradition of Cleveland State divers who have returned to coach here after graduation. His predecessor was diving star Jim Fedor, who was considered by many to be one of the finest divers ever produced at CSU, and recognized as an even better coach. As Fedor's pupil, Dalman broke many of his mentor's records, became a three-time Penn-Ohio Conference champion on both the one and three-meter boards, and qualified for four consecutive NCAA Zone Diving meets. However, winning almost as much notoriety for his hard luck as for his accomplishments on the boards at CSU, he was unable to complete in the NCAA's during his first two years due to broken bones in his arm suffered each year. A product of Massillon's Washington High School, Dalman coached the Perry High School Aquatic Club before assuming the reigns at CSU this season.

A LOOK AT THE TEAMS

THE MEN

The men's team faces one of its toughest schedules ever with the return of Pittsburgh to the dual meet schedule and the continuation of meets against such teams as Ohio State, Penn State, and Michigan State.

However, with ten returning lettermen, and a great recruiting year, the team is already anticipating another high finish in the Eastern Intercollegiate.

Experience will be the name of the game this year, and Morton is looking to senior **Tom Svitavsky** to finish his CSU swimming career as strongly as he started it three years ago, when, as a freshman, he set varsity records in the 400 IM and the 200 fly. After struggling with shoulder problems during his sophomore and junior years, Svitavsky seems to be ready to return to his old form.

1981's top high school recruit spent the better part of last season wrestling --- with mono --- but this year sophomore **Eric Zebold** is back, as healthy as ever, and ready to live up to his reputation for excellence. A state finalist in four different events during his last two years of swimming for Euclid High School, Zebold was hailed as the most outstanding swimmer in the Northeast Ohio District in 1981. Captain **Paul Vasiloff** was undefeated in dual meet competition and won six gold medals in Penn-Ohio Conference competition.

Junior diver **Richard Karban** returns after a strong finish in last year's Eastern Intercollegiate meet, and Morton is counting on Karban to "be perhaps the best diver in the history of the school, maybe even fulfilling that potential this season." Finishing eighth in Ohio in diving during his senior year at North Ridgeville High, Karban chose CSU over numerous other schools offering him scholarships because he found the facilities "beyond comparison."

This year's class of recruits is led by **Mike Kelly** from Hauppauge, N.Y. Kelly comes to CSU as the second fastest 200-yard freestyle ever recruited here.

THE WOMEN

Most of the top point-getters from last year's 11-3 team return to gladden new Head Coach Bob Kloos's heart this season. Brightening the picture further is a small crop of exceptionally talented recruits.

Leading the list of returnees is two-time "Most Outstanding" winner **Joan Weber** who added three varsity records (in the 200-backstroke and the 200 IM plus the 400 medley relay) to a personal collection which had reached nine by the end of last year. **Sue Burrows**, a transfer last season, lowered five individual varsity marks, including every freestyle record between 100 and 1000 yards, and surprising **Jean Standing** set new CSU marks in all the breaststroke events.

Versatile **Laura Zebold** and **Anne Cerer** sacrifice records for points. Both are used where needed most in any given meet, rather than concentrating on their top events, and both were among the Vikings top point-getters last year as a result. **Beth Obrochta** will garner points consistently in the butterfly and middle distance freestyle events. **Sharon Nekic** has been one of the team's most dependable performers in the freestyle events for four years.

Kloos has landed the best distance swimmer in Viking annals in freshman **Mary Zaworski**, the 1982 YMCA Regional Champion in the 500-yard freestyle and a four-time participant in the "Y" Nationals. He's also added a solid diver in **Monica Greczanik**, a district champion in high school last year.

The women will have trouble improving on last year's record, but they'll come close.
